The prize for the best student paper in AINZ is being offered again. Each prize period runs from the September to June issues, and the award announcement will be made at the conference.

Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Archaeological Authorities 2018-2019

It has been another busy year for Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga in processing archaeological authority applications. In total 641 applications were processed between 1 July 2018 and 30 June 2019, reflecting an increasing awareness in the responsibilities of adhering to the archaeological provisions of the Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Act (2014) when work may be affecting an archaeological site. Of the 641 applications, 521 were general, 10 minor effects, 5 scientific, 13 exploratory and 5 emergency. A further 87 were directly related to the 2010/2011 Canterbury earthquakes.

2018 Council Election

- A meeting with the Department of Conservation to strengthen the relationship between the two organisation
- Meetings with the heads of Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga, Historic Places Aotearoa and ICOMOS
