NEW YEAR HONOURS

It is with great pleasure that Council brings to the attention of members, the awarding of an OBE to John Hall-Jones in the New Year Honours list. This honour was bestowed in recognition of John's work in detailing the history of southern New Zealand - which has seen over 20 books published in the past 26 years. His *Fiordland Explored* and *Bluff Harbour* received the J.M. Sherrard Award for regional histories and *The South Explored* was highly commended. Another book, *Goldfields of the South*, was a Wattie Award finalist. In 1986 John changed his occupation from that of an ear, nose and throat specialist to become a full-time author and field researcher. His latest book, *Stewart Island Explored*, was published in late 1994.

HAM PARKER

It was with much sadness and many fond memories that I read of the death of Ham Parker. As one of his former students (1976-77) I would like to share with your readers this story which Ham shared with us, one afternoon in the Otago University Cafe (Ham assured us it was true - every word!).

As part of the WW2 North African desert campaign, a special 'decoy' unit was set up to deliberately distract German fighters and bombers from their real military targets. The unit consisted of fake plywood aircraft, buildings and an 'airstrip'. Every night a few trucks were driven around so as to give the impression (when seen from the air) of heavy activity (via the tracks in the sand).

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German intelligence must have got wind of the decoy operation fairly early on - because the dummy airfield was never bombed. Eventually the order came through from High Command to dismantle the operation and move on. On that same day, a lone German bomber flew over and dropped (what proved to be) a plywood bomb!

As the forthcoming NZAA Conference will be held in Dunedin this year, I would like to suggest that we former students and friends of Ham hold a wake for him at the Captain Cook Hotel.

Goodbye Ham, I greatly enjoyed your lectures, your encouragement and your company - my deepest sympathy to your dear wife Minh.
