NEW ZEALAND ARCHAEOLOGICAL DATELIST: UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO RADIOCARBON DATABASE

The University of Waikato Radiocarbon Laboratory has recently brought on line all New Zealand radiocarbon dates measured in the laboratory between 1982 and 1992. The resource is available via the World Wide Web. The datelist may be found at the following URL address:

The database is divided into the following regions: Northern (including Raoul Island, Northland, Auckland), Central North Island (Waikato, Coromandel, Bay of Plenty, Hawkes Bay), Wellington, Nelson/Marlborough, Canterbury/Westland and Otago/Southland. The information will be continually updated, but only radiocarbon dates from submitters who have given their consent are included.

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In addition, information regarding the Radiocarbon Laboratory may also be obtained, including an electronic sample submission form, information concerning sample size and prices and email addresses.

NEWS ABOUT NZ SCIENCE

Keep up to date with what happens in science and technology around New Zealand with the recently launched **Science Digest** - a summarised newsletter published monthly by The Royal Society of New Zealand.

The four-page Digest is packed with short, easy-to-read news items about science and technology. The Digest's key role is to communicate news from the national Society to branches, constituent societies, and individual members of

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the Royal Society, and to other organisations such as universities, polytechnics, research institutes, educational organisations and schools.

Archaeology in the North: Proceedings of the 1993 Australian Archaeological Association Conference, edited by Marjorie Sullivan, Sally Brockwell and Ann Webb. This recently published volume deals with a number of topics including the pioneer work of the eminent Australian archaeologist, Fred McCarthy, and the ongoing debate about middens, mounds and megapodes, to which Cambridge University Archaeology Professor Geoff Bailley, a leading expert in the field, makes a highly significant contribution in his paper 'The Weipa shell mounds: natural of cultural?'
