MBE for Ron Scarlett

Readers will be delighted to hear that life member of the Association, Ron Scarlett, was recently awarded an MBE, for services to science. Ron's involvement with the Association dates to the first conference, held at Auckland in 1956, at which time he became a founding member. He was also the first Editor of this publication, then called the *New Zealand Archaeological Association Newsletter*, and co-ordinated its production up until June 1961.

Ron made Canterbury Museum his professional home. His association with that museum began in the late 1940s with voluntary work on the avian collections and assistance with Roger Duff's moa excavations at Pyramid Valley. He was appointed to the staff of the museum in 1950, first as Recorder of Collections and later as Osteologist. Much of the results of his osteological research appear in works by other scientists, for whom he did an enormous amount of bone identification over the years. In 1972, his book, *Bones for the New Zealand Archaeologist*, was published and a festschrift in his honour, *Birds of a Feather*, appeared in 1979.

Ron described and named several extinct birds during his time at the museum, including a hawk, an owlet nightjar, a small rail, a pelican and a Pliocene penguin. Ron retired in 1981 but has held a Research Associate position at the museum since then.

Congratulations, Ron, for a well-deserved award.

AUSTRALASIAN ARCHAEOMETRY: RETROSPECTIVES FOR THE NEW MILLENNIUM: CALL FOR PAPERS

The Sixth Australasian Archaeometry Conference will be held at the Australian Museum, Sydney from 10-13 February 1997. As this will be the last official meeting on Australasian archaeometry this millennium, the Conference will present an overview of the current status of archaeometry, major achievements, recent advances, and applications. For this purpose, archaeometry is defined in the broadest context and contributions are sought from as wide a field as possible: suggested subject areas include Chronology, Technology, Characterisation, Climate and Environment, Biomedicine, Forgeries, Rock Art, etc.

At this early stage of planning, the organising committee invites contributions in the form of major reviews of techniques and applications as well as suggestions for paper and poster session on significant thematic issues that

place importance on interdisciplinary studies.

Preliminary Themes:

1. Human colonisation of Australasia and Oceania.

Extinction: its causes and timing.

3. Natural resources, production, trade and exchange in a worldwide perspective.

Academic sessions will be held at The Australian Museum and there will be a one day visit to the AMS and other facilities at ANSTO as well as a BBQ and business meeting to consider the organisation of the archaeometry community in Australasia, national facilities, etc. As with previous conferences distinguished overseas visitors will present public lectures in association with the conference.
