2017 NZAA Conference Papers and Poster Call

From 1st March 2017 we will be welcoming proposals of papers and posters on all aspects of New Zealand and Pacific archaeology, but encourage prospective participants to consider offerings that focus on current or recent research in New Zealand. We will also host a student papers session, where students are invited to present papers based on their research, either completed or ongoing. Students are welcome to present shorter papers, of 10-15 minutes. There is a themed paper session dedicated to Gold Mining. Submissions for this session are encouraged to consider: gold mining in New Zealand (or overseas), kauri logging, general early contact-period industrial archaeology, social aspects of goldfields life (including effects of mining on iwi), archaeology of the Hauraki-Coromandel region.

All papers (apart from student) must be 20 minutes long, and abstracts must be between 100 - 250 words. This year all proposals for papers and posters **must** include an abstract when registering interest with the Papers Coordinator. The deadline for the submissions is 12^{th} May 2017. Please send your proposals and abstracts to papers@nzarchaeology.org for consideration.

ArchSite News

At the end of January ArchSite was migrated from the servers it had been hosted on to AWS servers. This migration means a reduced hosting cost and a more stable, reliable platform. Now that ArchSite has moved to the new platform we can move to the next phase of development, which involves some minor enhancements. Most of these are back-end improvements, although some additional help text will be added to the 'Create Site' fields and some more fields will be made compulsory. The intention of these enhancements is to improve the quality assurance process, thus enabling pending sites to be processed more quickly.

The backlog of pending sites continues to be reduced, thanks to the excellent work of Emma Brooks and Nicola Molloy, and the improving quality of the data being submitted. And thanks are once more due to Emma and Nicola for all their hard work on this.

The Board of Governance is currently in the midst of a strategic planning exercise, which will guide future directions and underlie future planning for enhancements. As part of this process, ArchSite users and NZAA members will be surveyed about their preferred/most wanted enhancements.
